Apologies to all our member organisations for the lateness and short notice of this event. Uncertainty with Covid levels, illness amongst committee members, and other planning issues put a bit of a stall on things. However ...

Given the tremendous support you have given to the Federation over the past year as we recovered from previous periods, the Executive Committee have decided this year not only to be the hosts for the conference, but also to fund everything except the evening dinner for those attending. This means no registration fee, and no other charges aside from the meal in the evening for those who are still with us at that point.

You will still need to register and send in the form, and there may have to be an enforced limit on nonvoting attendees (ie. observers) per organisation due to accommodation restraints in the meeting room during the day.

In other news ...

The Incorporated Societies Bill passed its third reading on March 31, and us headed toward Royal Assent and finally passing into law as the new Act. Organisations who are registered as Incorporated Societies will, by now, have received emails from the Registrar regarding the coming changes, inviting you to take part in a survey of help you may need over the coming months to update and upgrade your constitutions/rules.

The new Aotearoa NZ History Curriculum emerged in schools in recent weeks, with full operation expected from 2023.

The Auckland Heritage Festival is on again. Same theme as last year's cancelled festival: Topography, taonga and trailblazers of Tāmaki Makaurau. Saturday 1 October to Sunday 16 October 2022.

"Learn about Auckland's rich heritage – from our natural landscape and historic architecture, through incredible treasures, to stories of our trailblazing people; all of which have made Tāmaki Makaurau the desire of many," the organisers (Auckland Council) say.

"In addition to the festival theme, events are also encouraged to align with these 3 main areas:

1. Learning and encouragement

Events designed to up-skill and inform the local community and to encourage greater understanding of our heritage through workshops and lectures.

2. Celebrating our heritage

Events that celebrate Auckland's distinct built, cultural and natural heritage.

3. Children and young people

Events suitable for families or aimed at young people. Please keep in mind when planning your event that both weeks of the festival are during the school holidays."
